### **MARYLAND/LIBERIA SISTER STATES DELEGATION TO TRAVEL TO LIBERIA ON A FACT FINDING MISSION**

Annapolis, MD/This week a delegation of business, civic, and education leaders will visit the Republic of Liberia. The delegation plans to officially consummate the State of Maryland, USA/Republic of Liberia Sister States relationship. This relationship was established on August 27, 2007 via a Memorandum of Understanding signed by Maryland (USA) Governor Martin O'Malley and Liberia's Superintendents Ranney Jackson and Sie Teba Neufville of Bong and Maryland Counties. This trip will foster our relationships and is aimed to revitalize the historic ties between the State of Maryland and the Republic of Liberia. The goal of the mission is to provide the participants with first-hand information, access to government officials and one-on-one meetings with leaders from Liberia's business, education, arts and healthcare communities.

During the visit the delegation will meet with President Ellen Johnson-Sirleaf. Johnson-Sirleaf is the first elected female president in the history of Africa. In January of this year, the Liberia Sister States Program launched its first project by

sending a team of engineers from Engineers Without Borders to conduct an assessment of Liberia's roads and infrastructure.

"This is definitely exciting. The Liberia Sister States Program is the newest and most accomplished. It is the only sister state relationship with Liberia, and Maryland's first with the continent of Africa," said Mendy Nitsch, who also serves as Executive Director of International Affairs for the Office of the Secretary of State.

Liberia, known as the gateway to West Africa, has an extensive historical relationship with the State of Maryland. In the 1830's the Maryland legislature created the Maryland State Colonization Society and allocated \$200,000 to return freed blacks to Africa. Those freed blacks settled in Maryland County, Liberia.

A country rich in natural resources, Liberia suffered a costly civil war in the last century for almost twenty years under the authoritarian rule of Charles Taylor. Since the inauguration of President Johnson-Sirleaf on January 16, 2006, the Harvard educated economist has brought massive economic resources to her nation to reinvest in the new Liberia. The United States has assisted in this effort by providing debt forgiveness to Liberia.

"This trip symbolizes more than a mission, it is an historic journey for us. Our forefathers took incredible risks as trailblazers to build a nation. We follow in their footsteps as modern day trailblazers to help rebuild Liberia." said Sharon Pinder, Executive Chair of Maryland/Liberia Sister States Program and leader of the mission.

Pinder knows intimately the value of the relationship between the Maryland and Liberia. About a decade ago while volunteering as Education Committee Chair for the Woodholme Foundation – an at risk youth scholarship organization – she met a young female political refugee named Biah. Pinder and her husband took the young Liberian into their home and adopted her. Today, Biah holds a BS in Public Health from Delaware State and is a Registered Nurse at the

Washington Hospital Center. This is her first trip home since she witnessed the massacre of her family.
